Cavell's Ontology of Film presents ten essays that reflect on The World Viewed, Stanley Cavell's now seminal film-philosophical book from 1971, and project its concepts and ideas into our future.

Readership

The World Viewed was first published (in 1971) by a popular press (Viking) while film studies were being established as an academic discipline (a discipline that would initially reject Cavell's book); its enlarged version was re-issued by Harvard UP before the end of the decade (1979). This should indicate that, like The World Viewed itself, this edited volume aims to speak at once to academic audiences and serious fans of film and TV. Indeed, as a "professional" Harvard philosopher of the ordinary, Cavell was a thinker who persistently pursued questions about ways in which philosophy, film, and popular culture intersect, and so do the essays in this volume.
